Minister's Musings

Last month I wrote about the changes in the Order of Service and the development of a new weekly newsletter that will all go into effect the beginning of July. Here is more information on this change as well as important changes to Horizons.

Take a moment to look at the top of the front cover of this publication do you see how it now says "Horizons Journal..."?

What is the difference between a Journal and a Newsletter?

For our purposes, the new weekly newsletter (we'll keep the name a surprise until the first edition is released on Friday, July 3) is going to focus on announcements and events just as our weekly bulletin has been doing all along. The weekly newsletter will be on one legal sized sheet of paper, front and back. The office will email it and post it up on our website every Friday afternoon. There will be limited hardcopies available each Sunday for visitors and those without internet access.

Horizons, the journal, will contain articles reporting on staff and committee work, much like a scientific journal reports on new research and developments in a field. There will still be a monthly calendar of events at the back for a quick reference of activities but the weekly newsletter will have the details of events and happenings. Starting with the October edition of Horizons we will stop sending hardcopies unless you contact the office to request hardcopy delivery.

Horizons will be emailed as a PDF attachment to all those for whom we have email addresses. We will continue to post Horizons on the website. **By going electronic we are saving well over \$4,200 a year as well as being environmentally friendly.**

Congregational Leaders Don't forget to start sending your UUCP announcements to announcements@phoenixuu.org starting Wednesday, July 1st in order to get them included in our first weekly newsletter.

From the Renovation

Committee

The Committee has been very busy the past few months. We completed all the steps required to prepare the summer 2009 renovation project that includes the following items:

- A new congregational sign on Lincoln Drive
- Doors, Windows, Fire Alarms, and Sprinklers in the 1965 Annex Building
- Fire Alarms and Sprinklers in the 1961 Classroom Wing of the Sanctuary building.

The building permit and the cost estimates are in the final stages. Financing will be with a loan that will pay for the construction work and

- Reimburse the Town of Paradise Valley for the Sidewalk construction (when/if billed)
- Fund up to \$30,000 in Capital Campaign Expenses
- Pay off the existing Bank of America Loan and UUC Foundation Loan
- Fund any loan closing costs

We will only draw what we need against a maximum loan amount of \$400,000, with interest only accruing on amounts we draw out. The terms of the loan satisfy the intent of all of the requirements for a loan approved at the February 1, 2009 Congregational Meeting.

A special Congregational meeting was called on June 21, 2009 that approved the loan and construction.
