Small Groups: December 2014

This December, we will be exploring what it means to live a life of faith within our liberal religious tradition. First let's look at the definitions of faith:

: strong belief or trust in someone or something

: belief in the existence of God

: strong religious feelings or beliefs

: a system of religious beliefs

I have been asked what do I mean when I say "our Unitarian Universalist faith?" On one hand, "faith" is simply another word for religion. This reflects the third definition. Even though UUs don't have a system of beliefs, we do have a set of principles, strong values around equity and compassion, and a particular history - faith refers to the collective of all these.

Faith, like other traditional religious language, can give us pause. Traditional definitions often don't work for us. For example, we tend to ask "Faith in who or faith in what?" That question limits our way of looking at faith and suggests that the only way to understand faith is in relationship to a theistic belief in God. In other words, if you don't believe in God, you can't have faith.

In talking to members of UUCP about this theme, I heard people describe faith as showing up. "Showing up, keep showing up, even when things get difficult, that is faith." Another person described it as being able, "even in the most fearful times, to hold on to bits of hope and gratitude." This leads me to the idea that faith actually has less to do with someone or something beyond ourselves, and more to do with our own capacity for perseverance and resilience. It is the ability to see some hope beyond the present moment.

Faith seems especially relevant at this time of year. It can take a lot of faith to get through the holidays. I say this both tongue-in-cheek and in all seriousness. The holidays tend to invite feelings of loneliness, revisiting loss and grief, and unresolved challenges with our families of origin. Add to this the particular struggles we might each be facing in this present moment: health concerns, concern for loved ones, fresh grief at the recent loss of loved ones. It all often gets heightened in the holiday season. This month, may you find bits of gratitude and hope to keep before you. May you remember that you are alive and that this is a gift. And may we all continue to feel some hope beyond the present moment that keeps us engaged in nurturing care and love into our lives and world.

Living the Theme: Faith

<u>Choose one</u> of the exercises below to engage the theme. Come to the meeting prepared to share how you tried to experience faith and what you learned from the practice.

Pencils and Pens

Artists often begin a drawing with a pencil, using their eraser liberally. When they are happy with their drawing, they "ink it in," using a pen to make it permanent. You can do something similar with old and new beliefs and doubts. Begin by making a list of words that evoke old and current beliefs and doubts, both religious and other, from the Tooth Fairy to God to alternative medicine. Using a pencil, arrange them on a blank page in some artistic way, varying their size, weight, and placement to indicate their importance in your life. Keep those beliefs and doubts you have left behind in pencil, but "ink in" the beliefs you feel sure of with a colored marker.

Journaling Suggestions

Faith and doubt often go hand in hand. The following journal exercises come from a chapter on doubt (see book below). **Choose one or more** journaling suggestions to explore:

- Make a list of some of the things you used to believe that you now doubt (religious and nonreligious, from "Sinners go to hell" to "If he loves me, he'll go to bed at the same time I do every night"). What made the change for you?
- Think about some of the things you believe and where those beliefs come from. How much weight do you give to your experiences versus the experience of others?
- Is there someone in your life now who encourages you to doubt or who listens without judgment when you express your doubts? How do you respond to that? If you are an encourager of questioning for others, how do they respond?
- What are some things (religious and nonreligious) that people around you believe but you doubt? How does your doubt affect your relationships with those who believe?
- How are faith, belief, certainty, and doubt related in your life? How do you feel about the idea that doubt is a good thing for faith?
- If you are questioning your theology at this time in your life, what are some questions you are focusing on?

Some Questions to Live With

As always, don't treat these questions as "homework." You do not need to engage every single one. Instead, simply look them over and find one that "hooks" you most. Live with it for a while. Allow it to regularly break into – and break open – your ordinary thoughts. Then come to your small group prepared to share that journey with the group.

- Is there a difference between faith and trust or confidence?
- Is faith the same thing as religion, or is religion the same thing as faith? How do you see them as related or different from each other?
- **How do you feel about the language of faith**? What do words like "sin" "evil" and "redemption" mean to you?
- Are there traditional words from a language of faith or language of reverence that still have meaning for you, even if you understand them in new ways? Some examples include holy, sacred, worship, spirit, sin, salvation.
- How does faith show up in your life? What does it mean to you? Was there a time in your life when you really needed and found faith? What did it look and feel like?
- It is during times of difficulty, that people most often look for faith. What keeps you going, what gives you hope, during very difficult times? Would you call this faith? Why or why not?
- How do we convey (how do you convey) your Unitarian Universalist faith to your children or grandchildren?
- Do you believe in God? UUs may be familiar with the sermon topic "Tell me about the God you don't believe in." What about the faith you don't believe in? Can you have faith if you don't believe in God?
- We all have faith in something. What is YOUR UU faith? What is OUR UU faith?
- Does faith imply or require action?
- If you were accused of being a UU would there be enough evidence to convict you? What would the evidence be?
- Alan Watts said, "... the attitude of faith is the very opposite of clinging to belief, or holding on." What is your personal definition of faith?
- Susan L. Taylor states, "Seeds of faith are always within us; sometimes it takes a crisis to nourish and encourage growth." Has your faith ever been tested?
- Mahatma Gandhi notes: "Faith is not something to grasp, it is a state to grow into." How has your faith evolved with age and experience?
- Doubt is not the opposite of faith; it is one element of faith. -Paul Tillich Faith which does not doubt is dead faith. -Miguel de Unamuno, The Agony of Christianity How does doubt play into your faith?
