

FIRST UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST CHURCH OF PHOENIX CONGREGATIONAL MEETING JANUARY 21, 1990

The meeting was called to order by President Joan Laurence. Fifty members are required for a quorum, and 53 were present when the meeting was convened.

The purpose of the meeting was to adopt a budget for 1990. Joan outlined the budget process, and turned the meeting over to Diane Olson, Treasurer. Diane stated the church ended 1989 in the black, and then distributed copies of the 1990 budget. The main points in the budget that were highlighted by Diane were:

- 1. \$3900 pledge shortfall protection.
- 2. Boosts salary to Interim Minister to Level E.
- 3. Increases custodian from 1/4 time to 1/2 time.
- 4. Gives salary increases of 7% to the Church Administrator, and approximately 8% to organist, bookkeeper, and maintenance person.
- 5. Purchases duplicator over a period longer than one year.
- 6. Increases UUA/PSWD contribution from 40% to 50%.
- Provides for RG&L consultant and one education module for RGL Director.
- 8. Provides specific funds for extended families, summer services, and spring membership coffees.

After a discussion of several items, it was moved and seconded to approve a budget in the amount of \$166,712 for 1990. The motion was approved unanamously by a voice vote.

My personal special thanks to Carol Hargis and the Personnel Committee, to the Interim Planning Committee for all their work, and to the Stallworthys whose efforts as our Denominational Affairs Representatives have brought us closer to the district and the denomination. Thanks also to Jim Lynch, Todd Heglund and Diane Olson, my co-officers, for their long hours of hard work and good counseling, and to Ellie Murphy for her service above and beyond the call of duty.

In terms of my goals for the church when I began my term, I am excited and encouraged to know that Bettye Doty will join us in the fall to lead us through our interim adventure, while a very able search committee works to find and recommend a new permanent minister. I know that while we shall miss Ray, we will go forward from a position of strength.

Last year, I closed with a wish that our "oasis in the desert" would continue to grow in loving kindness. Well, it has and I know that it will thanks to all of us!

The Music Committee will continue to coordinate the music for the church and to try to meet the congregations' needs and requests.

#### PERSONNEL

The Personnel Committee acts as the liaison between the Board of Trustees and the paid staff of the church, much in the way the personnel department of a business functions. The Committee advertises staff openings, interviews candidates, and recommends candidates to staff position supervisors, for subsequent approval by the minister and Board of Trustees. The Committee reviews staff salaries, handles personnel problems, develops personnel policies, and reviews and updates job descriptions for non-ministerial staff positions.

The focus of committee work this year has been developing policies and procedures for personnel activities which provide a basic structure for future committees and guidelines for church staff. The committee developed an organizational chart for use by staff and committees, procedures for evaluation of staff and staff recruitment and selection, formats for job descriptions and annual goal setting for professional staff. All job descriptions are now current and all staff have had annual evaluations.

The committee has established a vacation and holiday schedule for the full time staff and a personnel record keeping system is being developed. Currently the committee is in the process of filling two vacant staff positions.

#### RELIGIOUS GROWTH & LEARNING

We are one of the most active and well known committees in the Church. We usually have a paid Director and part time assistant. The paid staff handle the day-to-day operational necessities. The committee is composed of volunteers from the congregation who meet monthly with the paid staff to orchestrate the operation of the children's Church school and plan and coordinate all aspects of the Religious Growth and Learning (RG&L) programs.

The children's <u>Church School</u> consists of 6 classes which are held during the adult Sunday service and are taught entirely by volunteers from the congregation. The following numbers of children were registered and/or attended the Church school program during the 1989-90 year: nursery educare-24, 3's and 4's-20, 5's--22, 6's and 7's-21, 8's and 9's-25, 10's and 11's-18. About 15 youth also attended meetings of the junior high and Liberal Religious Youth (high school students who met Tuesday evenings) groups. These numbers, of course, reflect the total of all individual children who attended throughout the year. Far fewer attend on any given Sunday because few families attend Church every Sunday.

In addition to the children's Church School, the Religious Growth and Learning Committee is responsible for adult learning programs, the Unitarian Early Education Cooperative (UEEC), Kids Kamp, and liaison with the Desert View Learning Center (DVLC).

The Religious Growth and Learning prospectus for adults this year included the following classes: <u>Joseph Campbell and the Power of Myth</u> and <u>Liberals Read the Bible</u>. These classes met on Sundays during the hour preceding the service. Sherri Burke also facilitated a Conflict Resolution Workshop on a Sunday afternoon.

The <u>Unitarian Early Education Cooperative's</u> purpose "is to bring parents and children together in a learning environment that supports children's growth and parents' participation in the process." It includes a Tuesday-Thursday 2 year old toddler group, a Monday-Wednesday-Friday 3 year old group, and a Monday through Thursday 4 year old preschool. These three groups all meet from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and come together in an optional extended care program called Lunch Bunch from 11:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. The cooperative aspects of UEEC include parents' attendance at monthly 'parent meetings, parents' participation in the classroom twice a month, and other supportive roles in the

program. Each class has a paid teacher and aide who design the curriculum and room environment in consultation with the UEEC Directors Bonnie Kertman and Kathy Knowler (Church member), who has a Ph.D. in Early Childhood. Kathy, unfortunately, resigned at the end of the 1989-90 year but Susan Cedar, past Director, is returning as a consultant. Although only two children from the congregation were part of the co-op this year, children from Church families are given priority admission and there are five Church children registered for the 1990-91 year. The UEEC has a separate, self-sufficient budget including paying fees to the Church for room expense reimbursement.

Kids Kamp is a three-week day camp in June for children ages three through eleven years. The focus is on individual growth through play and creative expression. In the summer of 1989, 6 of the 65 children who attended were from Church member families. Kids Kamp also provides a 3-week, well-paid opportunity for youth employment as counselors; 8 of the 14 paid youth counselors in summer 1989 were Church members. The program is self-sufficient in its budget and the fee it contributes for room expense reimbursement usually covers the June cooling bill for the Church.

Desert View Learning Center is a private, alternative early elementary school that uses 4 of the Church school rooms during the week and uses other rooms in the Church by permission. DVLC is based on a philosophy of individualized instruction in a non-competitive ungraded atmosphere. Two children of Church families were registered during 1989-90 school year.

The UEEC and Kids Kamp are both historically Church-initiated programs under the overall direction of the RG&L Committee but usually function independently. DVLC is autonomous but its principles are clearly congruent with Unitarian-Universalism and a continuation of the educational philosophy of the UEEC. The RG&L Committee views all three of these weekday programs as outreach programs of a Unitarian philosophy in the nurture of young children to the larger Phoenix metropolitan community.

There has been a lot of transition in the RG&L program during this year. Our previous Director of 14 years, Donna Lee, remarried and accepted an interim ministry with her husband, Sam Wright, in the Marin County Church starting September 1989. The Committee worked with the Board of Directors over the summer to hire Church member, Sherri Burke, as an interim director. During the year, she has done an excellent job of maintaining and improving the programs and their operation and participating with the Pacific Southwest District Religious Education committee to broaden her experience in UU religious programs.

Jean Berry, longtime Church member who assisted both Donna Lee and previous RE Director Peg Gooding intermittently through their

tenures, continued as assistant. This helped immeasureably in maintaining continuity and in enabling both Sherri and the Committee to fill in gaps in our knowledge after Donna's departure. However, health problems made it necessary for her to quit in the spring. Her very unexpected death in May shocked and saddened allof us. Her bubbly zest for life and ready willingness to help in many areas is missed by members throughout the congregation.

The nursery program for the children under age 3 shifted successfully this year to what we call an "educaring" approach (from the work of L.A. infant specialist, Magda Gerber). Consistent adult volunteers arranged an environment for infants and toddlers that respected their individuality and their need to self-initiate exploration and create meaning in their world. This respectful learning approach has impacted the committee's planning for all age levels as we look more critically at facilitating individual search for truth in all the children. We've rearranged our age groupings slightly for the 1990-91 year and given each class a name that affirms their developmental needs: Nursery Educare 3), Explorers (3's and 4's), Searchers (5's and 6's), Voyagers (7's and 8's), UU Spirits (9's, 10's and 11's), Questers (12's and 13's). The age ranges are flexible so our groupings are able to be more fluid to meet childrens' individual needs without rigid categories. We are also planning to have the Affirmation class meet in the fall with About Your Sexuality being available to the same age group in the spring. We are hoping to have a retreat session to outline more effective and respectful plans for the junior and senior high youth.

The RG&L programs only succeed because of the constant generous participation and personal growth of many adult members of the Church. The Committee is always looking for new members to help with ongoing operation of programs and provide new insights for innovation as we all continue our religious growth and learning.

## SOCIAL ACTION

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"Never doubt that a small group of thoughtful, committed citizens can change the world. Indeed, it is the only thing that ever has." --Margaret Mead

The Social Action Committee with its open membership of about 20 persons is enjoying a very active year. Our goal and issues for 1990 were selected by group process in Jan/Feb and reflected our strong individual commitments. Individual members of the

committee have taken responsibility for their own areas of interest, reporting to and receiving ideas and support from the committee.

Our action issues have included outreach to our own congregation and the larger community. Our social action table set up each Sunday in the back of the sanctuary, as well as regular updates in the Horizons, allows the congregation to share in our projects and interests. Our committee had a display booth at the Peace Fair and Earth Day community events. We hosted at our church the showing of the film "Romero" which raised \$240 to support the refugee work of the Valley Religious Task Force on Central America. The committee and our congregation raised over \$700 for the AZ AIDS Project "Walk for Life" fundraiser. We have set up on-going voter registration and a political letter-writing area in the church alcove.

Another committee goal is direct service to the hungry and homeless. We have raised \$2000 and are in the process of selecting a family to house for 12 to 18 months in our House of Ruth project. On Sunday mornings church members and guests have purchased over 400 bags of beans which are sold at our social action table for \$1 each to donate to the downtown food kitchen Andre House.

We continue our work with and commitment to Valley Interfaith Project (VIP), a coalition of 40 congregations working together to empower people and to work for progressive change in Arizona. Several committee members participated in a VIP action in South Phoenix to support the efforts of the people in that community to get better police protection from gang activities in their neighborhoods.

Other committee interest include the new UUSC "Promise the Children" program, care of our environment, recycling, peace issues, national health care, Martin Luther King Holiday, and animal concerns. Our successful projects and enthusiastic momentum reflect the wonderful support from the congregation. We look forward to developing more projects and involving more people.

#### WOMAN SPIRIT

Womanspirit groups are an important part of the church's commitment to the spiritual growth and support of women. The first groups began in the early 1980's and although individual members come and go, there is a strong continuity from year to year.

Last fall after a group potluck, open to all women who were interested in joining Womanspirit, the members were divided roughly by the geographical designations of East, West and Central. The Westside group has a strong core of longtime participants. The Eastside group originally began the year with twenty-six members with individual meetings running between ten and fifteen people.
